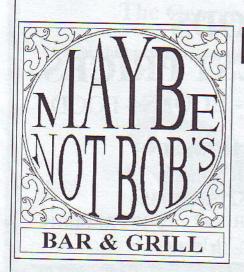

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### Man of La Mancha - Plot Summary

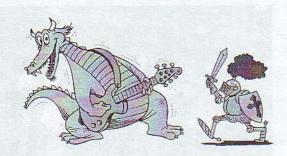
Don Miguel de Cervantes and his manservant are thrown into prison, not because they have been presenting plays - although they have - but because in Cervantes' other job as a tax collector he has served a tax notice on a church. In a Spain under the thrall of the Inquisition, this is a foolish mistake indeed. In prison the two stand out, and the prisoners, trying to distract themselves from their terrible situation, taunt them and threaten to burn a manuscript that is clearly precious to Cervantes. He begs for the chance to defend himself, and save the manuscript.

His defence takes the form of a play, and he and the servant place the prisoners in various roles in his strange tale of a nobleman Alonzo Quijana, who has seemingly lost his reason. He believes he is a knight errant called 'Don Quixote' who, with his faithful sidekick Sancho, has a mission to defend the weak and to fight all evil, most especially his nemesis the 'Great Enchanter'. As the tale unfolds we see how Don Quixote defeats the roughest of the rough and infuriates - then captivates - a cynical serving girl, 'Aldonza', with the strength of his crazy conventions. Some of the prisoners are gradually won over by this marvellous tale.

But not all are convinced, given an environment where passion and fear are running high, and where faith, idealism, and even 'rationality' are under the threat of being 'put to the question'. Cervantes struggles to find an end to his tale that will satisfy the prisoners, and is cut short by the arrival of a summons for him and his servant to appear before the Inquisition. Are the two sets of judges too much, or can the spirit of 'Don Quixote' win out and show that no matter what, the important thing is to 'dream the impossible dream'?

Coming from a musical background, Brian's first involvement with theatre was in the UK, writing the music for "Dawn made Myth", which went to the Edinburgh festival. Since his abrupt introduction to performing musical theatre in the shape of the 1995 production of "Fiddler on the roof", he has been an active Pirate, playing Ali Hakim in Oklahoma, various roles in a number of Pirates' review shows and codirecting the 1997 Pirates pantomine, "The Grand Old Duke of York". A great admirer of Stephen Sondheim, directing "Company" in 2002 was a major project setting out a firm interest in drama with music rather than the extravaganza type of musical. He has often been heard to swear he would never direct again, yet he's back again, directing his favourite musical, "Man of La Mancha".

Prior to coming to Luxembourg and joining Pirates last year (just in time for their production of Showtime), Philip worked as MD for musical theatre companies in the UK, Holland and USA. He has also provided music and sound for many straight plays. His musical background is as a trumpet player in symphony orchestras and brass quintets but, like many brass players, it all started in a village band. Here in Luxembourg, he has also worked with Voices International and more recently composed and performed incidental music for the Art Echo project, working with local actors and writers. Philip even tried acting for a while but without great acclaim. He says, "The greatest thing about being a musician in the theatre is that they never make you put the book down!"

## **Cervantes and the Inquisition**

Miguel de Cervantes y Saavedra did indeed talk his way out of burning at the hands of the Inquisition to go on to publish the second volume of Don Quixote in 1615. He died shortly after in 1616, within ten days of his contemporary Shakespeare.

In the words of Dale Wasserman, the author of Man of La Mancha, this play is a tribute to "the tough and tender spirit" of this remarkable man.



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
