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Fiddler on the Roof

"A fiddler on the roof. Sounds crazy, no?" So begins Tevye, the village milkman, as he introduces us to the people of his village of Anatevka. The story follows the changing fortunes of Tevye, his family and the Jewish community in this little village in rural Russia, as they attempt to cope with changing customs and attitudes and with the growing wave of anti-Semitism which is sweeping across the country. We follow the tempestuous marriages of his three eldest daughters - one to a tailor, one to a radical reformist and one to a non-Jewish Russian, each marriage further eroding the values and principles which Tevye holds dear. Finally, even Anatevka cannot survive



the pogrom, and all the Jews are forced to leave the village, families splitting up to go their separate ways, perhaps never to meet again.

Fiddler on the Roof

Carrie O'Brien - her theatre credits include



Hamlet, Baby With The Bathwater, Antigone, American Dream, Baltimore Waltz, The Apple Tree, HMS Pinafore and Iolanthe. Carrie has directed As You Like It, Our Town, The Caucasian Chalk Circle, Threepenny Opera and Bourgeois Gentilhomme. This is her first production with Pirates.

Alan Carlisle - was born at an early age, and was called to the bar of the Royal Manchester College of Music not much later. There he remained for many years, despite the best efforts of the staff, until a period of dole-enforced sobriety prompted him to take a temporary job with ICL. Ten years later, the offer of the part (which Nanki-Poo part?) of



summoned him to Luxembourg, where he has remained ever since. He tends to assume that his early musical training entitles him to some respect.

Gilles Soeder - has spent the last four years flitting between the Conservatoire and the boards of various Luxembourg theatres, working on productions such as Sleeping Beauty, A Midsummer's Night Dream, Les Fourberies de



Scapin and Morts sans sépultures. Although this is his first credit as an Assistant Director, Gilles brings with him plenty of experience from his time in the theatre, both on stage and behind the scenes.



Larry Elliott - has appeared (briefly) in Philadelphia, Here I Come and Antigone and (insignificantly) in the films, Sherlock Holmes and the Leading Lady and Primary Motive. When he has time, he writes articles for the Reader's Digest (and, on occasion, theatre pieces for Luxembourg News).





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Christine Mitchell her Mum persuaded her to take drama and elocution lessons when she was eight. She didn't lose her Yorkshire accent indeed, she collected a few more besides - and has been hooked ever since. Has played a variety of roles in numerous musicals and plays and has directed a few herself. Christine is delighted to be part of Fiddler - and old favourite of hers.

Danushka (the family's young maid). Played a real romany in *Live Like Pigs* and was one of the witches and the gentlewoman in "The Scottish Play" (she appears to be superstitious, too!). Last, but not least, she appeared as Mrs. Smith in *The Monkey's Paw* in this year's evening of one-act plays.

another Pirates debutant. Michelle does not have much experience with musical productuions, having appeared in only two other shows, but enjoys acting very much and has been involved in several plays at the American International School of Luxembourg, where she is currently a student.

David Bennett

orginates from Torquay, South Devon, England. His artistic credentials include: Robin Hood -"aged 8, in saggy tights"; HMS Pinafore "aged 17"; Hello Dolly, Carousel; Fiddler On the Roof - "as Constable/Jew Russian Dancer"; Chicago; Olivert. Seven Brides For Seven Brothers: Camelot and My Fair Lady. David's greatest ambition is to make his international musical debut in Eschsûr-Alzette and his "worst moment in a musical" (that he will divulge, at least) is "losing bowler hat in the opening number of Chicago."

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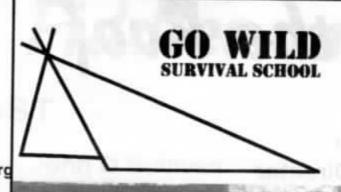
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"Ein Geiger auf dem Dach, das klingt verrückt, nicht wahr?" So beginnt Tevye, der Dorfinilchmann, als er uns den Bewohnern seines Dorfes Anatevka vorstellt. Die Geschichte befaßt sich mit dem wechselhaften Leben von Tevye, seiner Familie und der jüdischen Gemeinschaft in diesem kleinen Dorf im ländlichen Rußland, die versuchen, mit den sich ändern den Gebräuchen und Einstellungen als auch mit der wachsenden Welle des Antisemitismus fertig zu werden, die über das Land schwappt. Wir erleben die aufregenden Eheschließungen seiner drei ältesten Töchter - mit einem Schneider, einem radikalen Reformisten und einem nichtjüdischen Russen, wobei jede Eheschließung weiter die Werte und Prinzipen untergräbt, die Tevye so lieb sind. Schließlich bleibt auch Anatevka nicht von Pogrom versehont und alle Juden werden gezwungen, das Dorf zu verlassen, Familien werden auseinandergerissen und auf getrennte Wege geschickt, um sich vielleicht nie wiederzusehen.

"Un violoniste sur le toit. Ça a l'air dingue, non?" ainsi commence Tevye, le laitier de village, quand il nous présente les personnages de son village d'Anatevka. L'histoire racente les différentes aventures de Tevye, de sa famille et de la communauté juive dans ce petit village de Russie rurale, qui essaient de s'adapter aux us et coutumes changeants et à la vague croissante de l'antisémitisme qui envahit le pays. Nous participons aux mariages mouvementés de ses trois filles aînées- l'une s'unit à un tailleur, l'autre à un réformiste radical et la troisième à un Russe non juif, chaque mariage amenuisant encore les valeurs et les principes chers-à Tovye. Enfin, même Anatevka ne peut survivre au pogrom, et tous les Juifs sont forcés de quitter le village, des familles se séparant, peut-être pour ne plus jamais se revoir.

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
